Joint Report of the President and the Executive Director March 2006

Since 1969 the Crisis Centre has provided confidential, free crisis intervention support and suicide prevention education to individuals both in and beyond the Lower Mainland. Human resources are our greatest strength: over 260 front line volunteers, a volunteer board of directors, a small but effective professional staff, and many generous donors. Our unique organization proves that a volunteer-based model can provide high quality crisis intervention and suicide prevention education.

In 2005, the Crisis Centre's tradition of service and innovation continued:

- YouthInBC.com provides confidential, non-judgmental, free, live one-on-one chats on the internet with trained volunteers. We're open every day between 4pm and midnight. An increasing number of BC students have been accessing YouthInBC.com over the past year:
 - unique visitors per month has increased from 528 to 983
 - chats per month has increased from 30 to 94
 - emails per month has increased from 10 to 29

The Crisis Centre has received enquiries from other crisis centres throughout North America about our technology and methods.

- In April, the Crisis Centre was instrumental in securing funding (\$100,000) on behalf of the Canadian Association of Suicide Prevention (CASP), from the Public Health Agency of Canada. The objective of this project was to connect the Canadian Distress Line Network, representing all regions of Canada, through one easy to remember three-digit number: 511. This included a formal application to the CRTC February 15th, 2006 and exploring new Canadian accreditation possibilities for crisis intervention.
- In June, the Distress Line was successfully recertified by the American Association of Suicidology with excellent marks in all categories and securing the highest possible ratings in: Administration, Training Procedures, General Service Delivery Systems, Services in Life-threatening crises, Ethical Issues, and Community Integration.
- In September, the 1-800-SUICIDE prevention service completed its first year of operation. This toll-free line provides a confidential, 24-hour service for people who are suicidal, those who are concerned for someone that is suicidal or who have lost a loved one to suicide. The five network partners throughout the five health regions of BC respond to distress calls with the goal that every call made is answered by a trained volunteer. Funding for this initiative originally came from HYDRECS (\$125,000) and Vancouver Foundation (\$35,000). It will now be funded by the Provincial Health Services Authority for the next two years.

2005 was a productive year on a variety of fronts:

- Distress Line calls totalled 23,683. We responded to hundreds of e-mails from distressed individuals. Community Education facilitated 543 interactive workshops involving over 16,000 high school students.

- YouthInBC.com was judged by the BC Technology Social Venture Partners as an innovative and sustainable project. They are supplying technical assistance and \$90,000 until 2008.
- In June, the Distress Line Network of British Columbia, led by the Crisis Centre, won the BC Association of Broadcasters Humanity Award for \$3 million worth of TV and radio advertising.
- In November, YouthInBC.com was a finalist for the Vancity \$1 Million Dollar Award, coming second with 4,751 votes to the winner's 5,246.
- In November, the Distress Line won the Crisis Intervention category at the Canadian Donner Awards of Excellence and a \$5,000 first prize.

Some plans for 2006-07 include:

- Expanding the hours of operation for YouthInBC.com beyond eight hours a day and exploring possibilities of licensing this life-saving technology to other crisis centres.
- Executing a strong Vancity \$1 Million Award campaign throughout the Lower Mainland's 44 Vancity branches.
- Leading a partnership of Distress Centres in BC, as a model for the Canadian Distress Line Network, under the umbrella of CASP and securing second year funding for \$150,000 from the Public Health Agency of Canada.
- Completing a new Choices package by June 2007, based on our own external evaluation and the latest international research.

Finally, every year sees the departure of treasured familiar faces. This year was no exception. A number of long-term front line volunteers moved on to other commitments, and we said good-bye to staff and board members who played significant roles in the Crisis Centre's development. We sadly lost our past President, Steve Cowan, in February 2006. Thankfully, we were very successful in finding new and talented staff and over 120 new front line volunteers, allowing us to look ahead with confidence.

The Crisis Centre's important contribution to our community is only possible because of the talent, commitment, and financial support that we receive from all of you. Thank you!

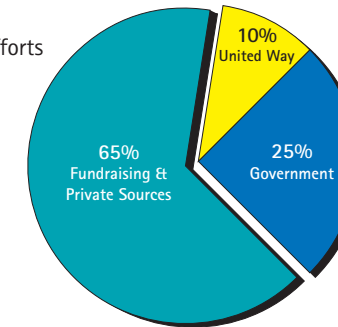

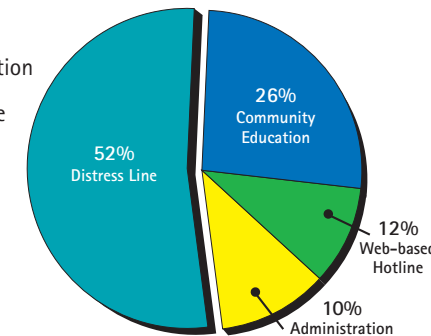
